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



AAA Pain in the Back!


What is an AAA?

An abdominal aortic aneurysm is the enlargement and weakening of the aorta (the largest artery in the body). Although it typically is asymptomatic and found on routine imaging studies (x-ray, CT scan), the most common symptom is referred pain to your lower back. Outcomes are

deadly if undiagnosed and/or untreated.

What symptoms are associated with a "Triple A"?

The back pain will typically be sudden, severe, constant and have a pulsing quality.



Pain may radiate into the groin region. Physical examination will demonstrate evidence of a widened and more palpable abdominal pulse (more than 1" from the midline) located above the belly button. Stethoscope auscultation may demonstrate "bruit" a whirling noise made as blood circles within the enlarged artery. Pulses in the lower legs may be weakened and unequal between the legs.

Who typically develops an AAA?

This condition has a slight predilection toward the male population. Persons are typically obese and may suffer from hypertension (high blood pressure) or hypercholesterolemia (high cholesterol). It is more prevalent in smokers and/ or persons with breathing conditions (COPD, Emphysema). There is also a hereditary pattern to this condition. Each of the aforementioned habits/traits promotes arteriosclerosis (hardening of the arteries) that will predispose the arteries to damage.

How is it diagnosed?

When physical examination findings warrant further investigation, standard x-ray or a CT (cat) scan may be performed to evaluate the abdominal aorta. If enlargement is noted, it is measured and treated according to its severity.

When is surgery necessary?


Surgical repair is necessary if the abdominal aorta measures greater than 5.5cm in diameter or if while being monitored it has worsened greater than .6-.8cm within a year. This is considered a high-risk condition with a high mortality rate of 80% if rupture occurs.

How can chiropractic treatment help?


By proper diagnosis, evaluation and referral to a thoracic vascular specialist. Treatment of an AAA is contraindicated and one of the many disqualifiers of physical medicine treatment. That is one of the many reasons why a proper physical examination is performed prior to any treatment in our facility.

Vision in 2020

Efforts to improving and understanding eve health and all its implication are under way in 2020. New research and development are re-

shaping and defining new avenues in eye care. Here is what the future holds

Clinical trials are under way using existing eye tracking devices to aid in hearing tests for infants, children with developmental deficits, and others who cannot perform the push button response to audito-

ry stimuli. Researchers out of Oregon University found that pupils dilate in response to sound. Studies designed to compare the accuracy of this finding demonstrate this involuntary response to be just as accurate as the traditional push button

method. This could lead to earlier and more accurate diagnosis of hearing loss in children.

New research out of Stanford University has proven artificial vision can be paired with natural vision. Testing is still being done with mice, but researchers have been able to replace damaged retinal tissue


with a prosthetic implantable device and blend it to work along with the remaining healthy retina.

Millions of Americans suffer from vision loss due to Diabetes and Macular Degeneration. Once fully developed this device could help some regain lost sight. Human trials are still in a distant future, but the technology looks promising. This technology may also be the steppingstone for other prosthetic neural devices that bridge the interface between machine and the brain. Can you say cyborg?

Researchers in the United Kingdom have found that Glaucoma has been linked to air pollution. The populous living in polluted areas has a 6% higher chance of developing Glaucoma. Glaucoma is the leading global cause of irreversible blindness and affects over 60 million people worldwide. It most commonly results from a build up of pressure from the fluid in the eye, causing damage to the optic nerve that connects the eye to the brain. The increased pressure causes degeneration of the optic nerve which leads to loss of vision. Air pollution may be contributing to Glaucoma due to the constriction of blood vessels, which ties into air pollution's links to an increased risk of heart problems. Another possibility is that particulates may have a direct toxic effect damaging the nervous system. Further research is underway.

The only way for new technologies and improved detection systems to be affective is for you to get your yearly eye examination. Let the year 2020 inspire everyone to be more vision and eye health conscience.

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Only rain in the drain! SJRA Stormwater Inlet Marking (SwIM) Program


Most people do not realize the rain water that flows down our streets, over parking lots, through parks and yards, and into open drains flows directly into Lake Conroe. Our community actions and behaviors have a significant and direct impact on preserving high water quality in the Lake Conroe Watershed.


Stormwater runoff drains directly to waterways without being filtered or treated at a wastewater treatment plant or sewage facility. It picks up pollutants such

as pet waste, grass, oil residue, pesticides, and fertilizers on its way to the drain and the lake. Additionally, disposing of liquids such as paint, gas-

oline, or motor oil in the storm drain is the same as dumping it directly right into the lake.

Contaminated stormwater runoff can be harmful to plants and animals that inhabit the lake, can clog pipes and drains increasing the risk of flooding, and can pose a health risk to those







who come in contact with the water fishing, swimming, or skiing.

With a focus to preserve the high quality of Lake Conroe, the San Jacinto River Authority's (SJRA) Stormwater Inlet Marking (SwIM) Program was created in 2015 as a visual reminder that only rain belongs down the drain. SwIM is an educational and "hands-on" outreach program to improve water quality by raising awareness of illegal dumping of pollutants into the storm sewer system.

The program not only aims to reduce dumping, but it also serves as a community service activity. The SwIM Program gives local communities, schools, groups, and others the opportunity to lend a hand by applying storm drain inlet marker medallions to the top of storm drains in neighborhoods throughout the Lake Conroe Watershed.

Lake Conroe is currently one of the highest quality bodies of water in the greater Houston area, meeting or exceeding all the Clean Water Act standards for contact recreation, public water supply, and aquatic habitat. Proper removal of pet waste, trash pick-up, suitable chemical disposal, and accurate fertilizer application can all preserve the high quality of Lake Conroe.



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












TREE LIGHTING

Christmas tree decorations have become an accepted custom dating back to the 19th century when it was the custom to decorate the tree with candles. By the mid 20th century, decorating progressed to a display with strings of electric lights.

The first known lighting with strings of electric lights was the creation of Edward H. Johnson, an associate of inventor Thomas Edison, in 1882. He proudly decorated a tree with hand-wired string of electric bulbs, 80 red, white and blue bulbs the size of walnuts. In 1891, electricity was brought to the residence of the president of the United States in the US Capitol in Washington, DC, according to a story in the Association of Mature American Citizens Holiday edition of their magazine. The Association is a competitor of the ACLU. The Edison Company installed a generator for the White House and for the State, War, and Navy building next door, today known as Eisenhower's Executive Office Building, according to the Association's story.

"Wires were strung across the lawn and en-

tered the White House under the conservatory. Round switches were fitted in each room to turn the current on and off. However, in those days, many people preferred gas lighting over electric based on the fear of electric shocks," the Association's article reported. President Benjamin Harrison and his family, who resided in the White house at the time, reportedly were afraid to operate the lights and asked the White House staff to handle this task. In 1894, during the presidency of Grover Cleveland, electric lights appeared for the first time on a White House Christmas tree. A picture of the tree appeared with the article.

This publicity helped to "popularize the use of Christmas tree lights in America." However, it was not until 1923, during the presidency of Calvin Coolidge that the present tradition of the National Christmas Tree on the Ellipse began. A 48-foot balsam fir from Vermont was decorated with a "variety of 2,500 red, green and white electric lights" that year. The tree lighting ceremony remains a very important part of White House traditions in Washington, DC today. ◆

VA Mission Act Success

When VA began implementing the VA MISSION Act this past June, they knew it had the potential to make an enormous positive impact for Veterans. Now, more than six months later, we know that that is the case: With the MISSION Act, VA is helping more Veterans access the care and services they need, when and where they need

One of the biggest accomplishments VA has achieved under this law is the launch of a new, consolidated community care program. This program uses simplified eligibility standards that are easier for Veterans, their families, VA staff, and community providers to navigate. This new network now includes 880,000 community providers across the country.

This program also includes a new urgent care benefit that allows Veterans to seek care for minor injuries and illnesses from urgent care clinics that are a part of VA's contracted network

But improving access to community care is just one piece of the puzzle. Under the MISSION Act, VA is now implementing "anywhere to anywhere" telehealth, meaning VA can bring provider expertise across state lines and into Veterans' own living rooms - meeting them where they are. VA recently announced the delivery of telehealth services to more than 900,000 Veterans over 2.6 million episodes of care in fiscal 2019 - an increase of 17% over the previous year. This extraordinary progress gives Veterans more convenient care options without traveling to their provider's office.

Looking toward the future

The provisions of the MISSION Act stretch out to 2034, and VA progress will continue. In the next few months VA will enhance secure information sharing with community providers, delivering safer, better-coordinated care for Veterans. The VA has also stood up a new Innovation Center, intensified focus on underserved facilities, started a pilot program to include Veteran peer support in primary care, and will expand VA's Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers to support Veterans of all eras.



- Children as young as 6 months can receive their first dental visit.

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The following is provided for informational purposes only and is not, nor should it be construed as legal advice.

Effective on September 1, 2015, Texas joined a growing group of other states by passing legislation that can transfer title to real property upon the death of a person without going through probate proceedings. It should be noted that this procedure does not eliminate the need for a Last Will and Testament or for the trust provisions in that Will, but it does fill a long needed niche for those persons who have relatively simple estates and have the ability to pass other assets owned as non-probate assets. This article is dedicated to answering common questions which are anticipated surrounding this new law/estate planning tool.

• WHAT IS A "TRANSFER ON DEATH DEED?" - Simply stated, it's a deed which does

not take effect until your death. It yields a result similar to a survivorship designation on your bank account. It will automatically pass title to the beneficiaries that you name without the need of a probate proceeding. It is anticipated that this tool will be particularly useful when the only real asset owned by decedent is an interest in real property such as the Homestead.

- CAN I NAME AN ALTERNATE BENE-FICIARY, JUST IN CASE THE PRIMARY BEN-EFICIARY NAMED HAS PRECEDED ME IN DEATH? Yes, in a typical situation where a deceased spouse wishes to pass his/her interest in community property to the surviving spouse and then to the children if there is no surviving spouse, this creates a very simple and uncomplicated method of doing so.
 - WHO CAN EXECUTE THIS TYPE OF

- DEED? Anyone who holds title to real property in Texas can execute a transfer on death deed.
- WHAT ARE THE REQUIREMENTS FOR THIS TYPE OF DEED TO BE EFFECTIVE? (Est. \$114.055)
- 1. It must contain the essential elements and formalities of a deed;
- 2. It must state that the transfer of an interest in real property to the designated beneficiary is to occur at death; and
- 3. It must be recorded before the transferor's death in the deed records of the County Clerk's office of the county in which the real property is located.
- IS IT A TESTAMENTARY DOCUMENT? No, it is a non-testamentary document; therefore, the deed passes title to the real property involved outside of probate. (Est. §114.053)
- IS IT REVOCABLE? Yes, if you wish to cancel or otherwise void the deed during your lifetime, it can be done fairly simply through a revocation filed in the real property records with the same formality as the original deed. This is true even if another instrument, such as your Will, contract, or other document contains provisions which have contrary terms. (Est. §114.053)
- CAN I USE A POWER OF ATTORNEY TO EXECUTE THIS TYPE OF DEED? No, this is not a power that can be delegated to another person through a power of attorney. (Est. §114.054)
- WHAT IF MY WILL AND MY TRANSFER ON DEATH DEED ARE DIFFERENT IN




THE DISPOSITION OF MY REAL PROPERTY? A Will may not revoke or supersede a transfer on death deed. Therefore, if your Will gives "Blackacre" to Joe, and your transfer on death deed gives the same "Blackacre" to Sally, the title to "Blackacre" passes to Sally. ((Est. §114.05 7(b))

- WHAT IF I MAKE MY SPOUSE THE BENEFICIARY OF MY TRANSFER ON DEATH DEED AND THEN GET A DIVORCE? If a marriage between the transferor and a designated beneficiary is dissolved after a transfer on death deed is recorded, a final judgment of the court dissolving the marriage operates to revoke the transfer on death deed to that designated beneficiary, if notice of judgment is recorded before the transferor's death in the records of the County Clerk's office of the county where the deed is recorded. ((Est. §114.057 (c))
- · HOW DOES THE COUNTY CLERK DETERMINE WHEN THE PROPERTY TITLE PASSES FROM THE TRANSFEROR TO THE TRANSFEREE? A copy of the transferor's death certificate should be filed in the County Clerk's office in the county where the property is located in the deed records.
- MUST I HIRE AN ATTORNEY TO DRAFT THE DEED? The simple answer is both, yes and no. There is nothing in the law that prevents you from drafting your own legal documents, but most people find out (many in a hard way) that the relatively minor legal cost of performing this service is very small compared to the cost of the litigation and unintended consequences which could ensue from improperly drafted documents.
- WHAT IF I OUTLIVE ALL THE BEN-EFICIARIES NAMED IN MY TRANSFER ON DEATH DEED? If there are no surviving beneficiaries of this transfer on death deed, then the deed shall be deemed to be canceled by you.

It is believed that future cases filed in the court will further clarify this statute. It should further be noted that this relatively new legislation does not replace the need for estate planning--- it only puts another tool in the toolbox of your estate planning attorney when he/she is drafting your Last Will and Testament.


Before working for a primary care physician Christi worked for another ENT specialist in College Station.


Christi will be working under my supervision and I will be available to answer difficult questions on patients with very complex problems.

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Can You Really "Make Money Online?"

Cutting through the spam to find out what really works, and how much work it really takes.

How many times have you seen those ads promising you an escape from your 9 to 5 job, living a life of luxury while you make tons of money using only a laptop and an internet connection? It's safe to say that no one is immune to these kinds of messages coming across their social media feeds almost daily. At this point, we aren't fooled. People running those ads are just selling something

and we aren't "buying" it. But it does make you wonder...

Aside from the sensationalist advertising that bombards us with the promise of financial freedom, is it actually possible? Can you really make money online? Can you really make

enough to quit your job and travel the world?

Well, actually, yes, you can, but to understand how, you need to let go of all those ideas you've been given and discover what it really takes. You also need to change your perception about the time commitment necessary to do it.

So, forget about all the survey-taking and network marketing and let's focus on a value-based way of making money: blogging. Starting and running a blog is one of the best ways to provide value to the world and make money online...if you do it right.

In short, here is the most common way to make money online by blogging in 3 steps:

- 1. Start a blog
- 2. Run ads on your blog
- 3. Sell something through your blog

(Again, this is the most common way. There are hundreds of other ways, but for the sake of simplicity let's focus on this method.)

That's really all you need to do. However, making a list like that simplifies the formula too much. In reality, here is a more honest approach:

1. Start a blog about something you care a lot about and that



other people are interested in, too. The more defined the topic, the better.

- 2. Learn the basics of writing for SEO (search engine optimization) and write articles that rank high on Google. It will take 3-6 months or longer to start seeing ranking results.
- 3. Start an email list of subscribers and email them new, highly valuable content consistently.
- 4. Depending on the size of your audience and the amount of competition, you will need to write 50-100 articles or more before you start to run ads. Basically, when your monthly traffic numbers exceed 10,000 visitors, you can start to make money through ads on your website.
 - 5. Write and publish consistently for 2 years, minimum.
- 6. Add affiliate links to your blog (like Amazon Affiliates) and send readers to those links through articles and resource pages.
 - 7. Create your own product or write a book and start selling it.

If you follow those steps you will make money online, guaranteed. If you continue this process for 5-10 years, you could eventually make a lot of money every month. However, you must know that it will take time to start seeing results, like real money in your bank account. Also, when you do start making money, it will be small amounts that trickle in. It will snowball into a lot more money over time...if you stick with it month after month for several years.

Before you go searching online for how to start a blog, please consider the following advice:

1. If you're just after the money, don't do it.

If your sole goal is to make money, then I strongly suggest not doing it. Why? There is a good chance you will get burnt out when things don't happen soon enough and you'll likely stop and start something else instead. You will make money when you provide value consistently for a while. That means you need to focus on something that you care about yourself – something that you consider valuable.

2. Commit to two years...minimum.

It takes time to rank on Google and to build trust with an audience. People start and stop blogs all the time. Your potential audience will pay more attention to you after they have seen you for a while and you've earned their trust by providing real value to their lives. This is the biggest reason people quit their blog. They don't see results fast enough and start to wonder if they are doing things wrong or if their content isn't very good. Ignore those thoughts and keep going.

3. You will have to grow as a person.

Committing to something for two years or more takes a lot of self-discipline and self-motivation. If you're the type of person who wants a quick fix, easy approach, then you will struggle. Commit to changing your habits and breaking out of old ways of thinking. Start a writing routine that ensures you publish consistently. Set goals and work hard to reach them. Get crystal clear on why you want to make extra money and what you plan to do with it.

Most importantly, you will need to let go of your expectations about how long it should take and how much money you should make.

So, do you have a passion that you love learning about? Are you an expert about something that you could help others get better at? Do you have a hobby that you spend a lot of time on? If you have something valuable to share with the world and are willing to devote a few years to sharing it, then yes, you can make money online.

Chicken and Sweet Potatoes With Shallots

1 1/2 pounds sweet potatoes, peeled and cut into 2-inch pieces

kosher salt and black pepper

- 4 tablespoons olive oil
- 4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts (each 6 ounces)
- 4 shallots, sliced into thin rings
- 2 tablespoons roughly chopped fresh rosemary

Place the sweet potatoes in a large pot. Add enough cold water to cover and bring to a boil.

Add 1-teaspoon salt, reduce heat, and simmer until tender, 14 to 16 minutes. Reserve ¼ cup of the cooking water, drain the sweet potatoes, and return them to the pot. Mash with the reserved cooking water.

Meanwhile, heat 1 tablespoon of the oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Season the chicken with ½ teaspoon salt and ¼ teaspoon pepper.

Cook the chicken until golden brown and cooked through, 7 to 8 minutes per side. Transfer to plates. Wipe out the skillet. Heat the remaining 3 tablespoons of oil over medium-high heat. Add the shallots, rosemary, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and 1/4 teaspoon pepper and cook, stirring, until the shallots are tender, 3 to 4 minutes.

Serve the chicken with the potatoes and drizzle with the shallot mixture.

Balsamic-Glozed Lamb Meat Loaf

2 slices white sandwich bread, torn into small

- 1-pound ground lamb
- 1 large egg
- 4 cloves garlic, chopped
- 2 tablespoons fresh thyme leaves

kosher salt and black pepper

- 2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 small red bell pepper, thinly sliced
- 1/2 red onion, thinly sliced
- 2 15.5-ounce cans cannellini beans, rinsed
- 1-tablespoon fresh lemon juice

Heat oven to 400° F. In a large bowl, combine the bread and 3 tablespoons water. Add the lamb, egg, half the garlic, half the thyme, 34 teaspoon salt, and ¼ teaspoon pepper.

Place the mixture on a foil-lined baking sheet and shape into a 6-inch loaf (about 3 inches thick). Bake, brushing with the balsamic vinegar several times during cooking, until a thermometer inserted in the center registers 150° F, 30 to 35 minutes. Let rest at least 5 minutes before slicing.

Meanwhile, heat the oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add the bell pepper, onion, and the remaining garlic and thyme and cook, tossing occasionally, until the vegetables begin to soften, 4 to 5 minutes. Add the beans, ½ teaspoon salt, and ¼ teaspoon pepper and cook until heated through, 2 to 3 minutes; stir in the lemon juice. Serve with the meat loaf.

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Growing Your Own Food

There is nothing tastier than homegrown fruits and veggies. Most people think that they are unable to grow their own food but it is easier than you think. As a matter of fact, home food production is now the fastest growing segment of the gardening industry with young people leading this trend.

Last month we talked about fruit trees. Remember, get your fruit trees planted before the end of March, preferably by the end of February. This month we will start focusing on vegetables. Next month we will talk more about veggies and touch on herbs.

How Much Room do I Need?

If you have room for a 12" pot you have enough room for a vegetable garden, however most people will allocate much more room for their bounty. We have customers that have started growing their vegetables in large plastic pots because of the ease of weeding and picking. Growing in pots will also help you control soil moisture because of improved drainage. For those that prefer growing in the ground, they will grow their edibles in raised beds as small as 2'x4' to plots as large as 2 acres. The most important thing is to have a location that gets plenty of sunlight with good organic soil and drainage. Over the past several years with our increased rainfall, we have had many of our customers fail with their gardens because of poor drainage.

Soil Preparation

The proper soil is paramount to a successful vegetable garden. A good vegetable garden requires soil that has good drainage, has a good amount of organic matter, with proper PH and the right balance of fertilizer. For those of you that have struggled with a vegetable garden in the past, I recommend having a lab like the one at Texas A&M perform a basic soil sample analysis. These tests are inexpensive and can end up saving you a lot of money in unnecessary fertilizer and other amendments as well as time and money in plants that won't grow or produce. If you go by the Agrilife Extension Office, over by the Montgomery County Airport, they have the soil sample kits.

Varieties of Vegetables

We can grow many of the veggies you see in the grocery stores here without much trouble. These plants can be planted by seed or starts in small pots. The most common spring veggies we sell as 4" starts are tomatoes followed by peppers then squash and cucumbers. We also sell strawberries and some melons. You will find the largest selection of vegetable starts in the area in our vegetable greenhouse.

When to Plant Spring Veggies

Because of our usually mild climate, we can plant tomatoes as early as mid February with vigilance and readily available protection. Seeds can be started indoors in small pots and moved outdoors once the weather has changed. Seeds planted outdoors need to be planted at the right time to

assure good germination.

We have those gardeners that always want to be the first in the neighborhood to have tomatoes and will come in as early as the first of February for their plants. They are brave souls. As a rule, by the end of April most people are done planting their spring gardens.

Tomatoes

Tomatoes are by far the most popular plant for home gardeners. They are easy to grow and will produce the most bang for your buck. They range in size from the sweet million that will only grow to about 3/8 inch in diameter to something like the Beefsteak, which can get to be a pound or more.

Heirloom tomatoes have become all the rage lately. Heirlooms are the predecessors of our modern day tomatoes and many people claim that the heirloom tomatoes are better for you and have much better taste. That may be the case but I can tell you that modern hybrid varieties resist common diseases much better than most of the heirlooms.

Peppers

The second most popular vegetable plants we sell are peppers. Whether you like mild or hot, there is a variety for you. All peppers grow well here and take our heat well. I have seen and heard of peppers lasting through the winter and getting woody stalks on them and continue to produce peppers year after year. However, new tender peppers are one of the wimpiest plants I have ever seen. They are grown in warm greenhouses in the early spring and do not have the ability to take cold windy weather that we might occasionally see before it finally turns warm.

Cucurbits

Cucurbits are plants such as cucumbers, squash, watermelon, cantaloupe, and pumpkins. The plants in this group are easy to grow and are heavy producers. As you probably know these plants will need much more space to grow because of their aggressive spreading nature. Plants in the squash family will produce a large crop then fizzle out. Because of this many people will plant at least one more crop after the first one if they want to keep getting squash later in the summer. Most people buy the squash and cucumbers as starts whereas the watermelons, cantaloupes and pumpkins are planted by seeds.

Other Vegetable Plants

If you go to our website www.growersoutletinwillis.com and go to our Edibles page there is a great amount of information available on what and when to plant in Montgomery County.

Pollination

Pollination is one of the most important elements of fruit and vegetable production. The biggest part of pollination is the presence of bees. As bees go from flower to flower they carry with them the essence of life. Pollination is also accomplished by wind but the efficiency is far less superior than with bees. It is possible to pollinate mechanically but it is a painstaking process using an artist brush going from flower to flower. If you have had trouble getting a good harvest from your plants in the past and the plants are healthy and flowering, pay attention to the number of bees flying around your plants. This could be the problem.

Things to do in February

*It is important to resist the temptation to heavily prune plants with major freeze damage until after the threat of a heavy freeze. If you feel compelled to trim some of the ugliness from your plants, just give them a tidy haircut. If you trim down into green wood, STOP. Green wood exposed to hard freezes can sometimes cause fatal damage to tender plants.

*Get your bare root fruit trees planted before it starts warming up.

*Amend your vegetable gardens with well composted organic material, such as our leaf mold compost, worm castings, or soil conditioner if you prefer, use some mushroom compost.

*Put down Nitro Phos Barricade pre-emergent weed killer to get a jump on those weeds that normally start popping up early in the spring or as an organic alternative you could use some corn gluten meal.

*Prune Crape Myrtles anytime in February. At a minimum, remove last year's seedpods. A good rule of thumb; do not prune anything bigger than a pencil.

*Valentine's Day is rose pruning day. Prune back hybrid tea and floribunda roses not shorter than 18 inches in height. Make all cuts ¼ to ½ inch above the outward facing buds. DO NOT PRUNE climbing or antique roses until after their bloom cycle. Knock Out roses can be pruned to 6-8" above the soil line if you want to keep them shorter and bushier. After pruning, fertilize with a good rose food like Nelson's Color Star, Microlife organic fertilizer or Nitro Phos Rose fertilizer.

*Broadleaf weeds can be controlled now with a product like Bonide Weed Beater Ultra.

*Spray plants like hollies, hawthorns, camellias, magnolias, and other waxy leaf plants for scale. Recently we have seen an outbreak of scale on crape myrtles. Those should be sprayed as well at this time. The scale on crape myrtles is noticeable by the black sooty mold on the bark that may or may not have white patches on it. Come in to get our spray schedule to help control this problematic and persistent pest.

*Feed cool season annuals one more time.


*Prune peaches and plums

*If you didn't already do so in January, prune and fertilize shrubs and small trees except for azaleas and camellias. Those need to be trimmed and fertilized after they bloom.

*It is not uncommon for azaleas to lose a lot of leaves this time of year. Don't Panic.

*Now is the time to fertilize your pecans with a fertilizer formulated for pecans.

Purple Martin Majesty

January and February are the months to thoroughly clean and wash out your Purple Martin houses! The cleaner the house, the better your chances of attracting nesting martins. Soon now, the old males migrate back to Texas from South America and scope out nesting sites. Females and younger birds follow along later, and they eventually all come together in tight little family colonies. There is safety in numbers, and groups roost together, nest together, raise their young together, hunt together and warn each other of predators. If you are lucky enough to have some choose your martin houses, you will enjoy a constant noisy

whirlwind of community activity until the young birds have fledged and they all migrate back to South America in the fall.

Purple Martins are the largest swallows in North America with a 15" wing span but short forked tails. Like all swallows, martins are aerial insectivores that expertly snatch bugs while flying, so you won't see them at your seed feeders. They prefer to nest near water due to the flying insect hatches that swarm up from lakes and ponds. Although some people believe they are great for mosquito control, studies prove martins eat only a few mosquitoes! They tend to fly much higher to






catch their meals.

Unfortunately, there has been a decline in Purple Martin populations over the last few decades due to competing, non-native common house sparrows and starlings. These invasive species take over martin nesting sites, toss martin eggs and kill the chicks in the process. An entire martin condo with a dozen apartments can be forcefully taken over by just one determined male house sparrow!

In general Purple Martin houses have divided apartments, multiple perches, and are on retracting poles. The retracting pole allows the house to be brought down and cleaned before the next season starts. Man-made deterrents such as "sparrow spookers" can be attached to dissuade invasive bird species from destroying martin nests and taking command of the entire house. In addition, many people have had great nesting success by hanging batches of hollow gourds with the proper hole entry size.

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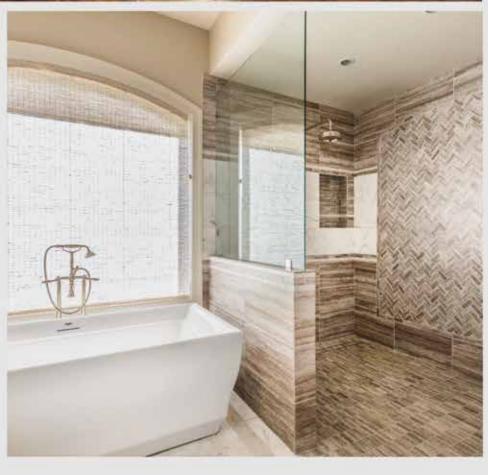
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Dead Trees Give New Life

Oh no, that tree is dead! We've all probably said that at one time or another. Spring arrives, all the trees and plants are budding out and "springing" back to life, but there's that one tree that just doesn't come back. The first inclination, of course, is that the tree has got to go. However, leaving dead trees is a vital part of maintaining a healthy environment, as dead trees can truly provide life after death.

The forestry term for a standing dead or partially dead tree is a snag. However, many people are starting to refer to these ghosts as "wildlife trees". In North America, as many as 85 species of birds, 50 species of mammals, and many, many reptiles and amphibians depend on dead trees

for shelter, food, and nesting. Dead trees are, of course, also home or food for many types of invertebrates (such as insects, spiders, worms, and more), which in turn also attract the birds, mammals, reptiles, and amphibians that feed on them. However, by far the greatest benefit dead trees provide to wildlife are cavities, or holes, in branches or trunks. These cavities are vitally important nesting and sheltering sites to many species, such as:

· Many types of birds will only nest in cavities, such as woodpeckers, chickadees, bluebirds, nuthatches, wrens, tree swallows, titmice, kestrels, and wood ducks

- · Eastern screech owls, barred owls, barn owls, and great horned owls
- · Mammals such as flying squirrels, gray squirrels, fox squirrels, raccoons, bats, porcupines. Even opossums, which are marsupials, will use tree cavities as dens.

Woodpeckers are the primary excavators for drilling cavities into snags. Abandoned woodpecker holes are then used by other species of birds that depend on them for nesting sites. Cavities are also used by frogs, snakes, honeybees, wasps, and spiders. In addition to providing shelter, dead trees or trees with dead limbs are also invaluable to

wildlife for other reasons:

- · Eagles, hawks, or owls use snags or dead branches when hunting to get a clear view of prey
- Ospreys may nest in larger snags near open water
- Birds that catch insects on the fly (such as flycatchers, smaller hawks, kites, shrikes, kestrels, and small owls) will use snags to launch their aerial attacks
- Snakes use logs from snags for multiple things, such as sheltering, hunting for prey, sunning themselves (for thermoregulation), or hibernating in winter.
- The woodpeckers who depend on snags for nesting also excavate them for insects, which provide them with the food they need for themselves and to raise their young. Some woodpeckers also store food (such as nuts or acorns) in holes they drill into dead trees.
- Salamanders use rotting logs as both shelter and a source of food (insects)
- · Many species of fungi grow only on dead wood

In wooded areas, it is thought that to maintain a healthy environment four or five snags should be left per acre. Of course, safety to people and property should be taken into consideration, and it is advisable to seek the advice of a profes-

sional arborist in some cases. It is important to assess the feasibility of leaving a dead tree as is, modifying the tree, or having to remove it due to safety concerns. Bear in mind that all dead trees will eventually lose limbs and fall, so retained dead trees should always be periodically reevaluated and trimmed or removed as needed. Not all snags can or should be saved. However, in some cases removing the entire tree may not be necessary.

When assessing a dead tree, look to see if there is any risk to a structure, pathway, or driveway from either falling limbs or the tree itself. Consider shortening the tree to a height that that reduces its risk of falling. The wider the trunk and taller the tree, the more value it is to wildlife. However, even a tree 10 feet in height can be of value for foraging and possibly for nesting. If limbs need to be trimmed back to lessen the fall hazard, try to leave at least 18" in length or longer (if you can safely do so). Limbs that are 6" or more in diameter are better suited for cavity excavation. If there is too much of a risk of falling limbs causing damage, you can always remove most limbs, just leaving some short and sturdy ones cut close to the trunk that can at least be used for perching.

While snags may not be the most attractive element of your landscape, they are invaluable to many types of wildlife, and they can provide you years of interesting and varied wildlife viewing. Please consider including snags in your landscape plans. If wildlife animals have a natural place to nest and shelter, it also greatly reduces the chances that they will try to get into your home, garage, or attic.

Friends of Texas Wildlife will be having an Open House on Saturday, March 21 from 11 am to 3 pm. At this open house, we will have many interesting educational displays. All our educational animals will be there for you to visit with (opossum; box turtles; snake; owls; and hawks). Staff from the Spring Creek Greenway Nature Center will be there with some of their snakes. For the first time ever, we will be offering "behind the scenes" tours of our flight enclosures and intake center. 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Lake Conroe **FISHING**

Black Bass: Many of the bass at this time of year will be holding to some type of cover while the water temperature stays cold. Boat docks, stumps and any rock or concrete are great areas to locate bass. Medium diving crank baits, plastic worms and spinner baits are good bait choices in all assorted colors.

Crappie: Decent numbers of crappie are caught along the pilings of the 1097 Bridge and around brush in 15' - 20' depths. Also, the Stubblefield Bridge on the far north end of the lake is holding good slabs of crappie as well. Minnows and jigs are both good bait choices.

White Bass & Hybrid Striped Bass: At this time these fish usually hold along drop offs of submerged humps and points in the main lake area. Slab spoons bounced along the bottom or trolling small pet spoons in these areas are great methods in locating and catching these strong fighting fish and they are good eating as well.

Catfish: Your best catfish action can be by baiting up areas along creek and river channels with sour grain or range cubes and fishing either chicken liver, shrimp or dip baits near the bottom in 15' - 25' depths. Also under the 1097 Bridge is another great catfishing area this time of year. ♦
